Friends, and the ability to make and keep friends, is an important part of a child's development. Children need the acceptance and support of their peers. Making and keeping friends is not as easy as one might think. First, you need to learn how to connect with others. After the initial contact, more complex social skills are needed to learn how to handle rejection well, how to handle peer pressure, how to be assertive and stick up for your rights, how to be aware of your own behaviors that interfere with friendships, as well as handling others' rude or irritating behaviors. For some children, this skill development may come naturally, but not for others. It may be more difficult. Friendship skills can be learned. It just takes time and practice.

Ask any AP student what happened the first week of May, May 2-6, and they will all answer the same thing: The AP exams! Of course they might not answer you with that much enthusiasm, considering each exam takes place over three hours at the beginning of the school day. Some would say the exams were “brain assault” while others thought they weren’t so bad.

These exams are based on college level classes the students have taken all year. The grading scale is a 5 point scale, 1 being the worst and 5 being the best (each student is guaranteed a 1 for putting their name on the exam). Students may receive college credit for scores between a 3 and a 5, depending on their college (many colleges only accept a score of a 4 or 5). P. G. told us, “Taking three exams last year made this year a lot less horrible, but it was still exhausting and I’m glad they’re over.” Students who took the exams came from grades 10 through 12. Junior N. W. was brave enough to tackle all of the morning session AP exams that week (Chemistry, Computer Science, Calculus, Literature, and US History). Exam scores will be sent to the students and the school in July.




IUS Continuous School Improvement in Action *Listen to the Music of the Night—D. M.*

Literacy Night!—D. M. and E. G.



Yesterday, the Hodja soccer team took on a Turkish men's squad here at IUS. The Hodja's came out victorious putting 5 goals into the net. Led by T. M., the defense played disciplined ball and held their opponents to only one goal. Goals for the Hodjas were produced by T. "too tall" L. (1), D. "perfect hair" B. (1), and a hat trick by "twinkle toes" A. W. (3). Assists were provided by L., W., and two by M. "what did you say" W.

The Hodja Football team played another strong game Saturday against the Turkish Club Men's team. The final score was IFC 6 – TCM 5. The first half the Hodja's jumped out in front 3-1, but minutes into the second half, TCM came storming back to tie the game. The game went back and forth until the last two minutes when D. "the mule" B. placed one in for the go-ahead goal. "The Mule" ended up with five goals (an Incirlik record for one game) and led the team to their first 500 record since 2002. The other goal was scored by D. "Muffins" D. with an assist from A. "twinkle toes" W. (2 assist Saturday).

The Hodja soccer team had a fine showing this weekend in Ankara. Their record was 1-2-1 with one of the losses by a late (extremely late) goal by Ankara. The team shellacked the first place team 4-1 with D. "the mule" B. getting a hat trick and T. "fresh scent" M. knocking one in from about 40 yards out. Larger than life Kudos goes to A. "twinkle toes" W. for shutting down their offensive threat and not allowing a single offensive goal.

When interviewing Mr. A. he said "I think we have a lot of individual talent that we haven't had in the years past and I think they are slowly learning fundamentals, and slowly learning how to work as a team. Their last game/ tournament were in Ankara last weekend; they won one game and tied one game and lost two games. Incirlik won 3 games 4 losses and 2 ties. The coach Mr. A. has been coaching since he was 19 and has been playing soccer since he was four. He has played recreation, high school soccer, and college intramurals for soccer. He has also coached at many different levels. D. B. said that Mr. A. is a very good coach. Which means Incirlik might have a chance at winning a championship this year.



Goal 2: By June 2011, all students will increase performance on targeted **Critical Thinking Skills** using instructional interventions implemented in all curricular areas as measured by the TN3 Math subtests, PSAT Math subtest and school-based assessments. The targeted skills are the ability to extract and apply essential information in a variety of situations.

NCA Accreditation: Our accreditation took place May 4 - 6, 2010. We receive five commendations, as well as being referred to as the “Model School for Continuous School Improvement” and a “Model School Turn Around.”
